## 'Toys For Tots' program shifts into high gear

The 2003 edition of the Barstow Community Tots for Tots Program is in full swing and MCLB Barstow military and civilian personnel are again joining forces to make the program as successful this year as it has in the past.

As always, the goal of the on-base program, spearheaded by the MCLB Barstow Fire and Emergency Services Division, is to give everyone an opportunity to donate unwrapped new toys to underprivileged children who may otherwise have nothing to wake up to on Christmas Day. Last year's on-base effort netted more than 400 toys, down from previous years, which MCLB Barstow donated to the Barstow community program during the annual Toys For Tots Telethon. Since 1947 the Marine Corps Reserve Toys For Tots program has collected and donated millions of toys to underprivileged children.

In 1995, the secretary of defense approved Toys for Tots as an official activity of the U.S. Marine Corps and an official mission of the Marine Corps Reserve.

In 1996, the commander of Marine Forces Reserve expanded Toys for Tots to cover all 50 states by authorized selected Marine Corps League Detachments and selected local community organizations, located in communities without a Marine Reserve Center, to conduct toy collection and distribution campaigns in the communities as part of the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program.

In 1999, the commander of Marine Forces Reserve delegated authority to the president of the Marine Toys for Tots Foundation to approve and manage local Toys for Tots campaigns conducted in communities without a reserve unit,

## Veterans History Project preserves stories, memories of America's war veterans

The letters, memoirs, audio interviews and photographs are "everything that you could imagine," said Ellen McCulloch-Lovell, director of the Veterans History Project (<http://www.loc.gov/folklife/vets/>), an effort begun by Congress two years ago to preserve the stories and memories of America's war veterans.

The letters, she said, speak of combat and what war was like. There are also stories of pranks and funny misfortunes that occurred while veterans were on leave. But most stories, she said, speak of the closeness and camaraderie within the military — "my buddies, my unit, and loyalty," she noted, adding, "Loyalty is a very big theme."

Another theme often written about is love and longing, she said,

"you know, longing for the folks back home." McCulloch-Lovell pointed out that the project is stepping up efforts to ensure the words of thousands of veterans are told to an even greater audience. She said this month the Veterans History Project began airing a series radio broadcast called "Coming Home."

The series features the oral biographies of 18 war veterans who tell of their war experiences and life in the military.

It's being aired via Public Radio International, which develops and supplies noncommercial audio content to affiliate stations throughout the country. McCulloch-Lovell said, "Nobody on the show is famous. It's all the individual stories of people who served."

The Veterans History Project has also expanded features on its Web site, to include more digi-

tized letters, photos and individual stories. Site visitors can now "see and listen" to the stories of 23 veterans, she said. And there is no shortage of stories to tell.

In the two years since the project began, McCulloch-Lovell said interest by veterans wanting to share their stories has increased immensely. For the past year, her staff of about 15 has been receiving as many as 200 submissions each week at the project's office, located inside the Library of Congress Folklife Center (<http://www.loc.gov/folklife/>) in Washington.

"I think the older veterans are not sitting back and waiting for someone to interview them," she said. "They're sitting down and writing these remarkable memoirs and personal stories and are sending them to us. We have a memoir that's 20 pages long. And we have another memoir that's 900

pages long."

Still, she said, even with the increased flow of mail arriving daily, the project staff tries to read each and every story. "We try to see and read everything that we can," she noted. "We can't quite keep up with it, but we really try to be familiar with the individual stories in the collection."

The project director observed that the collection is missing letters and stories from soldiers currently serving in Iraq and Afghanistan. "Once they get back home, and get some rest, and their life has settled, I'm sure we'll hear from them," she said.

McCulloch-Lovell said the letters and memories she now works to preserve and share with the public are much like the ones of her father, who served five years in the Navy aboard the USS

Enjoy the holiday with family or friends, but be watchful at occasions involving alcohol and driving.

Don't drink and drive or get in a vehicle with someone who has been drinking. Over the past year, our Corps has lost an unacceptable number of

Marines in preventable mishaps.

The losses from these mishaps are as tragic as those suffered from combat, and although the majority of Marines have returned safely from Operation Iraqi Freedom, the risk for mishaps is even higher now.

Statistically, three to six months after returning from deployment, Marines are at almost twice the risk of a vehicle-related death.

For many, this Thanksgiving

falls in that timeframe.

Also, Thanksgiving holiday is a particularly high-risk period due to the sheer volume of cars on the road.

All Marines should understand and manage these risks to

prevent the mishaps that are so destructive to our Corps.

Seatbelt use not only makes good sense in managing risk, it's the law. The annual "click it or ticket" campaign begins on November 18th.

Throughout the country, police departments will mobilize to enforce seatbelt laws.

Police departments do this because research has shown that seat belts save lives. Be smart, buckle up. Enjoy this Thanksgiving holiday, but do it wisely. I need each of you back at work, healthy and ready, when liberty is secured.

Travelers may experience delays of up to 45 minutes during the hours from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays.

Lane closures will be approximately 1.5 miles in length during paving operations. With cooler weather approaching, paving must be restricted to the warmest part of the day to facilitate the asphalt curing process.

Traffic is separated by concrete barrier with reduced lane widths for 20 miles just south of the paving project for the remainder of the construction.

Once complete in summer of 2004, the project will have constructed an 18-mile southbound truck-descending lane, re-paved all southbound mainline lanes as well as reconstruct the 18-mile northbound Baker Grade with long lasting concrete.

The speed limit is reduced to 55-mph throughout the 25-mile project limits from Baker north to Cima Road with a recommended speed of 45-mph through the detour.

The CHP can and will issue double fines for traffic violations through the construction zone.


In addition to construction activity, truck traffic has increased 30 percent along the I-15 corridor compared to last summer combined with a 4 percent increase in passenger vehicle traffic over the same time period.

Motorists are advised to stay alert for slow moving truck traffic and congestion as a result of construction. If possible, plan travel during the hours after 6 p.m. and before 6 a.m.

## FSA open season

The open season for the Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA) began on Nov. 10 and will run through Dec. 8, 2003. The open season of FSA coincides with the open season of the Federal Employee Health Benefits.

FSA's are effective financial management tools that can stretch the disposable incomes of the account holder and ensure that when funds are needed they are available to pay out-of-pocket medical expenses or dependant-care costs of a child or parent.

There are two FSA's. One is a Health Care FSA (HCFSA), which allows pre-tax reimbursements of eligible medical costs not covered or reimbursed by insurance.

The other FSA is a Dependand Care FSA (DCFSA) that allows participants to be reimbursed on a pre-

tax basis for childcare or adult dependant care expenses that are necessary to allow the employees and thier spouse to work or seek work.

Participation in the FSA is not automatic. Employees must make a voluntary election on an annual basis. If employees do not make an election during the open enrollment they will not have FSA for the following year. The benefit election is irrevocable once the plan year has begun unless the employee experiences a "change of status" event.

If by the end of the year the money in an employee's account is not used, it will be forfeited.

Hobby. She said she once spent an entire week helping her mother make photocopies of thousands of pages of letters her father mailed home during World War II. "We copied 1,822 pages of letters," she recalled.

Her mother had kept the letters for years, preserving them in protective plastic sleeves. "I knew she was archiving them," McCulloch-Lovell said. "It was a big project of hers after he died. It took awhile for me to find the time to spend a week with her, and I'm so glad that I did."

She said her father often spoke of his military experiences and even though she knew about the letters, she never bothered to read them. "I was lucky, my father did tell me about his experiences," she said, "although I never read the letters until he died."

McCulloch-Lovell said that personal experience of helping her mother that week gave her a "strong feeling" for how important it is to save the personal stories of war time—the "family treasures that tell about the person's experience in their own words."

On the importance of the Veterans History Project, she said that 100 years from now people will be able to look back and understand why veterans served. "A student, or family member or a historian, or journalist is going to be looking at this collection and understanding the experience of people who went through war and how it changed them and how it changed the country," she said. "Certainly our goals are to collect and to preserve the stories," she pointed out, "but I think we also have two very important goals—that we honor the service and that we educate future generations about what it's like to serve."

So when you are on top and want to stay there and you wonder why you cannot stay, remember that there are those people around you and in your community who never feel on top. They always feel just the opposite and are waiting for someone to come down from the mountain and share their experience with them.
